# **NEW AFFORDABLE HOUSING SOLUTIONS**

The housing crisis has hit our community especially hard - with our region losing the most affordable units for each one added in all of Canada.

It's part of why I'm doubling down on my advocacy to rapidly increase investments in new affordable housing - including a new motion to fix the criteria for affordable housing funding so that federal dollars result in truly affordable units (more on this soon).

At committee, I've also been working to build support for a simple measure proposed by the team at Habitat for Humanity: extending the HST exemption that for-profit developers already enjoy to non-profit affordable ownership builders. It could be easily paid for by ending a tax exemption that large corporate investors, largely buying up affordable housing and driving up prices, currently enjoy - just as I proposed two years ago.

If this had been in place for Habitat's build on Kehl Street, they would have had another million to invest in more units!

## ADDRESSING PRICE GOUGING greed continues to fuel the rising cost of

Corporate greed continues to fuel the rising cost of essentials, with Big Oil leading the way.

Over a year ago I proposed a simple solution in Motion 92: extending a windfall profit tax, already placed on banks and insurance companies for their excessive profiteering during the pandemic, to the oil and gas industry.

This measure would not only disincentivize price gouging, but raise \$4.2 billion for proven climate and affordability solutions - like free heat pumps and other green home retrofit incentives, and investments to both increase service and reduce fares for public transit now (rather than waiting for 2026-2027 as the governing party has proposed).

This fall, I'm glad to continue building cross-party support and advocating for this critical solution.

## **QUICK FACTS**



In 2022, Big Oil's profits increased by more than 18 cents per litre.

That year, the five largest oil and gas companies alone raked in \$38 billion in pure profit - and that's after they paid shareholders \$29 billion!



A 15% windfall tax on those profits would generate \$4.2 billion - every dollar of which could go to affordability solutions.

# **REDUCING THE STRAIN**

In the last decade, we've seen international student enrolment skyrocket in our community, going from 763 to over 30,000 international student permits at just one college. It's left community resources strained - from housing to employment - and left international students at risk of exploitation.

In the fall of last year, I introduced Motion 98 with ten reasonable measures to address both. By February, the federal government had adopted four - including opening up loans to help colleges and universities build more student housing, reducing reliance on off-campus options, and doubling the cost-of-living financial requirement for study permit applicants to be more in line with the true cost of living - helping to significantly reduce this year's permit numbers.

Now I'm continuing to press for the remaining measures - including ensuring students are able to show continued proof of financial support throughout their studies, that they're provided with information on their legal rights in Canada, and that educational institutions are accountable if the students they host don't actually enroll in courses.

# PUSHING TO FIX THE CANADA DISABILITY BENEFIT

Despite setting the expectation that they would address disproportionate poverty amongst folks with disabilities with their repeated promises to introduce "a Canada Disability Benefit modelled after the Guaranteed Income Supplement" that would "lift hundreds of thousands of people with disabilities out of poverty," we've seen the governing party's actions move them further away from follow-through at every critical step.

Their proposed Regulations for the Canada Disability Benefit are the latest example - which include limiting the maximum benefit

amount to just \$200 dollars per month, and locking it behind the incredibly burdensome application for the Disability Tax Credit.

A written response to my question at committee even revealed the governing party's own estimates suggest the benefit, as proposed, would lift a mere 25,000 people above the poverty line!

After consulting with people with disabilities in our community, these are some of the calls I included in my September submission to fix the proposed Regulations for the Canada Disability Benefit:

- Increase the maximum amount of the benefit to lift people with disabilities above the poverty line.
- Support the independence and dignity of people with disabilities by tying the benefit to the applicant's income, not their family's.
- Remove barriers to application by automatically enrolling recipients of federal and provincial disability support programs - like ODSP or CPPdisability.

Change is still possible. I'll keep pushing alongside the disability community to make it happen.

## ADVANCING OUR CALL FOR FOLLOW THROUGH ON TWO-WAY ALL-DAY GO



Amplifying the call for two-way all-day GO alongside commuters and MPP Clancy.

Our community was promised two-way all-day GO train service from Kitchener to Toronto more than a decade ago - yet we still don't even have a timeline for completion. In the meantime, folks are being left on platforms waiting for overcrowded buses that weren't designed for standing room to begin with!

Given the federal government has committed three-quarters of a billion dollars to the project - 40% of project costs - I've been pushing for accountability and a timeline for completion for over a year.

As part of advancing this call, I not only took it directly to the Prime Minister, but - together with local commuters and MPP Aislinn Clancy - amplified it to local and national media.
